Development of Robust Glycolic Acid–Producing *E. coli* strain through Evolutionary and Metabolic Engineering

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Existing engineered GA-producing strains have limited substrate consumption capacity due to carbon catabolite repression (CCR). Herein, *E. coli* utilizing D-xylose via Dahms pathway was further engineered to allow cellobiose uptake by expressing *cep94A* gene from *S. degredans*. Unlike glucose, cellobiose does not repress D-xylose uptake and metabolism as its intracellular degradation detours CCR resulting in maximum yield of 0.51 g GA g⁻¹ xylose. For a rapid cellobiose consumption, the GA-producing strain was subjected to adaptive laboratory evolution leading to the development of industrially-competitive GA-producing *E. coli* strain.
